while other members kept score. Two children from each school were eligible to compete in each class. Each pupil competing was allowed to choose his prize book. Those with highest points got first choice and we had several more books than children to ensure a good selection. The winning school received a good book about animals for their library, which they had requested.



A QUILT AND RUG FAIR

PLANS are in progress for the 1956 Simcoe County Quilt and Rug Fair to be held on July 25 to 28 inclusive. Those on the committees are doing their utmost to make this the best fair yet. This year it is to be held in the Exhibition Building in Collingwood.

The correspondent, Mrs. Frank Shearing, R.R. 4 Stayner, says: We are trying to make the Quilt and Rug Fair at Collingwood something really unusual. To our knowledge it is Ontario's only Quilt and Rug Fair. This is a non-competitive exhibit but the articles shown may be sold by the owners if they so desire. Very old quilts and rugs, the Pioneer ones, are treasures around which there is usually a human interest story. And of course a great many of the workers are Institute members! The ladies of the county have made two Simcoe County quilts—a map with lovely
