A Canadian Birds Quilt

SEEING a newspaper picture of a quilt block decorated with an embroidered bird, one of many bird patterned quilt blocks made by Mrs. C. Frayn of South Tarentorus Women's Institute, the editor wrote Mrs. Bert Egglesfield, a former F.W.I.O. board member for more information. This is Mrs. Egglesfield's story:

"Mrs. Frayn is a life member of South Tarentorus. She was always interested in birds and flowers and liked to embroider. Her quilt display is always an attraction at our annual bazaar.

"Mrs. Frayn's bird quilt is a work of art. Each picture block is lovely enough to deserve a frame of its own and could compete with the best of nature paintings. Using nothing but the most ordinary of implements, a needle and countless yards of bright coloured thread, Mrs. Frayn crea'ed replicas of such gay-plumed birds as the pheasant, cardinal, wood-pecker, not to mention the ducks. The prints have been reproduced with astonishing perfection and stand out vividly against the blue and grey background. Touches of rose pink give added character.

"It all started when Mrs. Frayn saw a colour print of some Canadian ducks. Interested, she wrote to the company from whence it came and received a whole album of birds common to this country. And then she went to work with tissue paper, tracing paper and pencil. From the prints Mrs. Frayn made patterns of the feathered beauties and traced them onto squares of pastel blue and grey cotton broadcloth. This was the nucleus of one of the most striking quilts ever seen at the Women's Institute's quilt display.

"For the 'Grandmother's Quilt Block Album' made by the branch, Mrs. Frayn embroidered a block copied from a picture of the Scarlet Tanager. The block received one-hundred points in the District competition."
