Here and There With the Institutes

Notes From Reports of Meetings

Programme Features Recommended

Algoma North Shore district was the first to send in its "Reports of Meetings" from the branches. Of these Bar River recommended to other branches especially their demonstration of artificial respiration by members of the St. John Ambulance Corps which resulted in the Institute taking a first aid course, ten Institute members and ten non-members participating. Gordon Lake mentioned the interest they found in gathering material for their Tweedsmuir history, and in sponsoring two 4-H Homemaking Clubs. Portlock Royal recommends discussion in meetings. The secretary reports: "In our discussions under various leaders we discussed such topics as The Hand Book, Radio and Teleision Evaluation, Ways to Shorten our Business Session and others. Questions were passed out to the members and a few minutes allowed for thought. Someone was always prepared to answer he questions. This broke the ice and a brisk discussion usually followed."

Long Point in South Norfolk mentioned a film on United Nations with a talk by a seventeenear-old high school student who had a trip to N. Vittoria had demonstrations in ceramics, lowers made from plastic foam, making chiffon cakes, icing and decorating cakes. Victoria Crescent mentioned demonstrations in the use of foam rubber, making slippers, cushions, aprons, flowers, table centres, earrings, gift wrapping. At the Mary Wallace Institute a feature of the December meeting was a demonstration on making Christmas decorations at little or no expense from twigs, cones and branches gathered in the woods. Wallace Goodwill enjoyed a film showing the making of pottery and, at the same meeting, a display of antique china made up of pieces brought to the meeting in response to the roll call. Peace likes to have demonstrations in hobbies such as copper tooling and to follow this by asking members who have taken up the hobby as a result of the demonstration to show their work at a meeting, Millbank

finds a study of the people who settled in the locality a most interesting programme feature. North Perth Maple Leaf had a debate "Resolved that modern woman is of more help to her husband than was her grandmother." (Would this be a good subject for a debate at a family night, letting both men and women take part? Ed.)

Nephton arranged a tour of the local mine "to acquaint the women with the work of their husbands." Warsaw had a talk explaining the new demerit system for car drivers.

Bradford recommends cookery demonstrations by new Canadians. Gilford had an interesting display of old books and stories about them by their owners; Denbigh a talk on fire prevention in rural schools. They installed a fire gong in the school. Mount Pleasant in East Durham mentioned particularly a demonstration on making cushions and inserting zippers and piping.

Bethany especially liked their speaker from the school for retarded children and they say "the craft work done by these children amazed us." Nestleton also mentioned this feature; they asked the Government to give a grant to the new school for retarded children being built at Ottawa.

Morrish had a veterinarian show a film and speak on rabies, and they invited the school children and the teacher to the meeting.

Maple Grove had an interesting meeting when several of the members gave short histories of the early settlers of the district and a teacher spoke of his work teaching the English language to new Canadians.

Falkland had a "home talent" program, each member making a contribution of two minutes or more. The report says: "We found talent we had not known of before and the meeting created a teeling of ease and belonging which we seemed to have lacked previously."
