ute to the work still being done there to keep alive the spirit of the movement which began more than sixty years ago. In her thanks, Mrs. Jackson issued a warm invitation to all to visit Stoney Creek and mentioned the fact that Squire's Hall, where the first Institute meeting was held, has been offered for sale.

## "Meet the Provinces"

Another highlight of the Convention, both from the standpoint of entertainment and information, was the presentation of an historical pageant, "Meet the Provinces," with Mrs. L. G. Lymburner as moderator. The part of Adelaide Hoodless was played charmingly by Mrs. Haggerty, and representatives from across Canada presented the story of the Women's Institute from the time of its origin on February 19, 1897, until the present day. The Junior Board Directors, all dressed in costumes appropriate to their particular period, presented the story of the founding of the organization in each of their respective provinces, and the provincial presidents commented on their plans for the present and for the future. This impressive production was thoroughly enjoyed by delegates and visitors alike.

## Resolutions

Three resolutions had been drafted by the Committee early in the term and were approved by the Board. One asked for the immediate construction of a Canadian National Library; another endorsed the stand of the Canadian Broadcasting League on broadcasting in Canada; and the third recommended that the Gaza Strip become an International Peace Garden.

Resolutions presented and accepted at the Convention were: a recommendation that the Senator Cairine Wilson Trophy Competition be analogous to a current F.W.I.C. study; that lists of UNESCO publications be published in Federated News; that consideration be given to a possible UNESCO project in Canada; that revisions be made in the Immigration Act, in part to avoid discrimination; and that support be given to the continued Federal investigation into the price of drugs.

Arising from various reports, the delegates endorsed support for the Canadian Conference on Education, promotion of Education Year in 1962, and participation in the celebration of Canada's Centennial in 1967.
