Mrs. James Haggerty, National President, Federated Women's Institutes of Canada, extended an invitation to Board Directors and all interested members to attend the unveiling of a plaque at the Adelaide Hoodless Home at St. Georges on Saturday, June 2nd. The National Historic Sites Committee will make arrangements for the ceremony and refreshments will be served by the branches in Brant districts.

A communication had been received, said Mrs. Haggerty, from interested persons in the community regarding the desirability of Squires Hall at Stoney Creek being preserved by F.W.I.C. As this is the place where the first Women's Institute was organized it should be of interest to members, now and in the future. Legal advice had been sought and it was suggested that a grant, not to exceed \$5,000, might be made if and when the building was purchased.

Talking to members at Workshops she had conducted, Mrs. Haggerty was surprised to discover that many members were quite unfamiliar with the Federated News, the F.W.L.C. publication. Reviewing the latest issue, she pointed out the many items of interest from the provinces and from A.C.W.W.
