Georgetown purchased an oxygen tent and a croup tent for the new district hospital.

Norval reports "We held euchres to raise funds for the new district hospital and the school for retarded children instead of canvassing the area."

Plainfield sent a request to the Roads Superintendent to have repairs made to a bridge that children had to pass over going to and from school.

Sidney South, organized in November 1961, at the time of reporting in May 1962, was already sponsoring two 4H Homemaking Clubs

and had a membership of sixty three.

Bluevale "wrote to the township councils concerned and they tidied up the cemetery."

Dance in Rainy River applied for a public health unit in the community and now they have one.

South Huron Junior Institute started a safety campaign trying to help people to be more safety conscious. They distributed Safety signs to schools and had a contest for the children in writing jingles to go with the signs. In co-operation with the Junior Farmers they took part in a field day, choir work, drama festival, various social events — and in "adopting an orphan child. The girls enjoyed the meeting very much at which they entertained their mothers at their mother and daughter banquet.

Muirkirk sponsors an annual picnic on the school grounds.

Arkona appointed a committee to see about having maps of the cemetery set up for public view at the cemetery.

Forest had its third annual Christmas Carol Festival with all the chuch choirs participating. (Editor's note: Probably all the schools took part too as they have done in previous years.)

Ravenswood sponsored a Memorial Day at the cemetery. So far as they could they got addresses of those who had family members buried in the cemetery and invited them to the service; also advertised it in the press. The Institute worked closely with the Cemetery Board and the local clergy.

Several Institutes in **Lincoln** are petitioning their council to provide a township dump to eliminate the clutter of rubbish dumped on the sideroads.

Union along with its annual party at the Home for Senior Citizens has adopted one of the residents. This branch had "An Evening of Music" for the community this year, given by a choir from Kitchener.

Vineland: "Our Institute bought a church that was going to be demolished and we moved it to a lot we had purchased sixteen years ago. We hope to have it in full swing in a few weeks for use as our Institute Hall and to oblige other organizations."

Poplar: borrowed a film from the Safety supply Manufacturing Company, Toronto, showing artificial respiration with mouth to mouth breathing. This was shown at a community social evening. Then they borrowed the Santa Claus Parade film from the T. Eaton Company and found that it was enjoyed by adults as well as children.
