

"Members of Sunday Creek Women's Institute recently held a quilting party to work on a Friendship Quilt," writes Mrs. B. Brownlee. "The quilt had been started in 1959 and worked on in leisure time. The quilt has gold embroidery on a green and white background. The larger centre panel has the Institute Crest, embroidered in the Institute colors, and the four corner panels have the provincial emblem, trilliums, in embroidery. The remaining quilt blocks have the names of the members of the Brentha Community embroidered on them.

"A somewhat similar 'Friendship Quilt' was made by the Brentha Ladies' Aid in 1909 and is kept in the community as a happy link with the past and holds human interest and historical values. Things like this, made and preserved by women's organizations, are priceless and become more valuable as the wars go by."

Otterville held a very successful Antique Show. Articles contributed for the show included dishes, cutlery, pictures, jewelry and quilts. Six ancient Chinese scrolls were also on display. We sent notices to twenty-seven groups, had an article in the local paper and a followup in the 'Coming Events' column; and we had the course announced from two radio stations. Sending out notices seemed more effective than posters or newspaper notices in publicizing the meeting."
