There was a resolution regarding the Succession Duty Act asking that \$50,000 be made true exemption and \$60,000 if estate goes entirely to widow. This was passed at last session of Parliament and Royal Assent granted at close of session, signed by James Allen.

In the Agricultural Hall of Fame on the C.N.E. grounds on November 17 an unveiling ceremony was held. Mrs. Hoodless was one of the twenty honored, three of whom were women. The Adelaide Hunter Hoodless painting is hung on the wall opposite the entrance.

Due to illness of the chairman of the C.N.E. Table Setting Competition Committee and inability of the other members to act, the Table Setting Competition was not carried out at the C.N.E. last year. If we should be invited to participate this year, the same committee would act.

The Constitution Committee appointed at last year's meeting was found not to be large enough and a motion was passed to increase it to five members, two of which should be sitting Board members.

Those members wishing to attend the convention, either as delegates from branch, district or area or as visitors, must send in their application to Mrs. Holder at 20 Spadina Road, Toronto before January 1st. A committee consisting of Mrs. Trivers, Mrs. Lymburner, Mrs. Holder and Mrs. I. B. Sharpe will review these applications.
