MRS. JAMES HAGGERTY, Napanee, Ontario, President Federated Women's Institutes of Canada has been named "The Woman of the Year" by the Napanee Business and Professional Women's Club. She was presented with an engraved statuette and a two-year honorary membership in the local Club in recognition of her many accomplishments in community and national affairs.

"Mrs. Haggerty has been a willing worker in community affairs and has always lent her services whenever needed. We, like all Napanee people, are proud of her accomplishments," said the citation accompanying the award. The highlights of Mrs. Haggerty's career were given, which included her many and varied activities with the Women's Institute, attendance at the FAO World Food Congress in Washington last summer as a representative of the Canadian Freedom from Hunger Committee, and her recent trip to the Mackenzie District.
