In **St. Paul's** list of program features we note talks on "How to Encourage Children to Read Good Books", with a roll call "Something I Learned from the Hand Book" and the motto: "The mind is like a parachute — it works best when it's open." A talk, "The Story of Canada's Freedoms"; roll call "A Canadian citizen of renown and why"; and the motto "The path to freedom is a way of duty." A talk on "How to Face Illness and Tragedy"; a roll call "The household gadget I find most useful"; and the motto "The person who is always beefing is likely to get himself in a stew."

Westwood had an address on Accident Prevention in the Home.

Morson: "The talk on municipal assessments and taxation, by the township clerk, cleared up many misconceptions that the average woman has on these subjects."

Alice had an address, with films, by a former tuberculosis patient — "very educational on the rehabilitation of a person who has spent some time in a sanitarium."

Goshen reports, "For a change and to suit some of our officers we had one morning meeting with lunch at noon. It was a success."

Russell Village recommends exchanging visits with other branches in the district so that members throughout the district may "get to know" each other better.

Severn Bridge borrowed the recording of Mrs. Haven Smith's speech at the F.W.I.O. sixty-fifth anniversary luncheon and invited four other branches to hear it with them. The tape-recording can be borrowed from the Home Economics Service Loan Library. **West Ward Evening** also used this record for an Open House meeting. At West Ward Evening branch each month a member brings up a point of interest from the Hand Book and a five minute discussion is held.

Coldwater Huronia Senior: "A speaker on Juvenile Delinquency and a teacher who spoke on Education laid facts before the young mothers of the Institute that should be very helpful in bringing up children."

At **Sunday Creek**, Centre Temiskaming, a "visiting teacher" gave an address on Reading Material and led a discussion on education. This Institute with a membership of eleven has a Tweedsmuir History and at their meeting on historical research they had a speaker who told about the district in the early 1900's.
