Community Activities

A great number of Institutes are doing an outstanding piece of work in sponsoring 4-H Homemaking Clubs for the girls of the community.

Phelps continues to maintain a hall, a public park and memorial as a remembrance and a place for recreation for the community; also cooperates with others in sponsoring a fall fair, a school nurse service and a skating and hockey club, giving the use of their park for a skating rink.

Kipling: A resolution regarding the renaming of a local lake was presented by the Institute and was taken up by the Chamber of Commerce. This branch tried—though without success—to get a dental clinic for the local school and its many neighborly projects included a shower of baby clothes for a mother of twins.

Teeterville's community activities included holding a flower show, an old school reunion and garden party, fourteen euchre parties,

eleven teen-town dances, and a Brunswick Stew supper; redecorating and adding a stage and kitchen to the Institute Hall (formerly a school house).

East Norfolk Junior Institute working mostly in cooperation with the Junior Farmers, visited the county health unit, helped a needy family, gave blood at the blood donors' clinic, entertained their families on family night. They contributed to the W. I. International Scholarship and to a local Nursing Bursary.

Most of the Institutes in **Norfolk County** are contributing to a Nurses' Bursary for the county.

Wooler has a Women's Institute park with slides, swings, teeters, etc. for small children. The picnic tables in the park are often used by visitors.

Brooklin sends four members each month to serve tea in the Red Cross project at Fairview Lodge for senior citizens at Whitby. In June the residents were invited to a tea at an Institute member's home in the country, and to provide the program. This Institute had a special meeting when 10 members, 14 adult visitors and 37 children saw a demonstration on making puppets and operating them.

Myrtle sent cookies to the Whitby Ontario Hospital at New Year's and plans were made to send parcels at regular times to the patients in one of the Cottages of the hospital.

Kintore community has a Recreation Committee which was originally sponsored by the Institute.

Mount Elgin gave a donation of \$50 to the public library and \$100 to assist the sports club with installing floodlights for the baseball diamond.

Norwich took over responsibility for the cleaning of the town's rest rooms which had been neglected.

Belfountain Rockside reports: "For the second year we have sponsored a square dancing project from fall to spring which is well attended by the younger set."

The Institutes of **North Peel** have been holding an annual "luncheon dessert euchre" to raise funds for their scholarship. The event is very popular and funds are raised with little difficulty.

Mono Road provides two members each month to staff the Health Unit's Baby Clinic. The Institute sponsored two bus trips this year in which members of the community were included—one trip to Stratford to see "The Taming of the Shrew", one to O'Keefe's, Toronto to see "The School for Scandal."

Among **Snelgrove's** many community activities was holding a benefit euchre for a local boy who had had a leg amputated in an accident.
