

Alliston Women's Institute representatives, Mrs. Hancey, past president, and Mrs. Peterman, president, present a \$1,500 cheque to officers of the local hospital board. The fund was raised mostly by catering, euchre parties and rent for the Institute hall.

Lynden used the Loan Library study kit on A.C.W.W. for a program at one meeting.

Adelaide Hoodless branch had a Polish woman speak on Poland and show Polish handicrafts. The roll call was: "Contributions immigrants have made to Canada in recent years."

Patricia reports: "At two meetings there were New Canadian women from our own community who came willingly to answer questions about their native countries but who did not know our language well enough to give a prepared speech. One was a housewife, one a gardener and in replying to our questions they shared much with us."

Winona reports: Binbrook and Blackheath Institutes, close neighbors of Winona, support a boy in the Jamaican School for the Deaf, through the Save the Children Fund. Last year a Winona member and her husband travelling in Jamaica visited the boy and his family and brought back pictures to show to the sponsoring Institutes. This shows not only an international interest but is also good public relations in both Canada and Jamaica."

Richmond Hill had a speech from a woman from Holland telling why she wanted to become a Canadian citizen.

Wexford had a program of recordings of music by famous composers with biographical sketches of the composers.

Historical Research

North Tarentorus had a "Front Page Challenge" program based on items collected for their Tweedsmuir History.

As a result of the Institute's study of local history a member of South Tarentorus was able to give information for the history of the United Church on its fiftieth anniversary; also to help a School Principal with the history of the schools of the township.

Seaforth was responsible for placing a memorial plaque for Col. A. Van Egmond in Van Egmond cemetery.

Harmony, reports that their Tweedsmuir history is "progressing favorably" and that they had the history of their town printed on folders. These will be placed in the local museum for sale and "the proceeds will go toward the printing of the Tweedsmuir history."

Clanbrassil: "We are trying to get the history of each member's farm."

Campbellville is working on a village history of every home and commercial building. One meeting was held at the local Kelso Museum where they had a talk by the Carator and some articles were presented to the museum. Ballinafad says that their meeting field at the museum "made them proud to live in Halton county."

South Sarawak and Keppel had a "M seum Meeting". A neighboring Institute provided the program with two speakers, one on Upper Canada Village, one on "The Museum and Its Needs."

Most of the Institutes of **Brant County** are contributing to the fund for renovation or repairs to the Mohawk Chapel on the Indian Reserve. Several gave donations to the Brand Historical Society.

Riverside's "most stimulating" roll call was "A pioneer incident." This Institute bought memberships in the Brant Historical Society for its convener of Historical Research and its Tweedsmuir History curator.

Tranquillity and Fairview supplied both historical information and money for the arection of a Cairn commemorating the old tranquillity school and church; also supplied ocal history to assist with a university these At one of their meetings they had a display of old books. Blackwell assisted a collegian student in compiling a history of the community.

Tutelo: "In October we held a travelling tea with a display of antiques. This started to be a pleasant afternoon for our own me bers but soon snowballed into quite a large todertaking. We had over 100 guests and considerably to our funds... We have so died the life of Pauline Johnson and as a result of this we are planning a bus tour to Chiefswood." (Tutelo is in Brant county, the lative county of Pauline Johnson.)

Norval had papers on the History of heir Fall Fair, the Credit Valley Conservation Authority and the Industries of Halton countries.

Beechwood: "Under the convenership of the committee on Historical Research we had an Antique Fair and Tea to which people of the community loaned articles for exhibit. There was no charge for the tea. Over one hundred signed the register and people were thrilled with the display."
