The Junior Institute Report prepared by Mrs. Drayson was read by Mrs. Cunnington. The opportunities we receive in our junior work better prepare us to meet the challenge of the future. The opportunity in rendering service, meeting our responsibilities and obligations with confidence and unwavering faith makes us realize how fortunate we are to have the choice to work with senior women.

Peel County expects to form a new Junior institute, Dixie Lane. Most of the clubs have advanced program planning six months of the year. Separate business meetings are held with a joint session of fellowship and recreation for the Junior Institute and Junior Farmers. Each meeting is co-ordinated to include the
