
The Cover Story

NE HUNDRED YEARS AGO the first cheese factory in Canada began producing Cheddar Cheese at Norwich. Ontario in Oxford County. Today it's a thirty million dollar industry in the province, producing eighty-three million pounds of cheese and more than forty varieties. The cheese tray on the cover presents six kinds of cheese, an assortment of crisp crackers and a colorful arrangement of fresh fruits. This combination is proving immensely popular as a dessert alternative or as a savory climax after a sweet. With a cup of steaming coffee, it's a hit with men and women for late evening refreshments, and it provides the table decoration as well as the dessert on many a buffet table.

The Home Economics Service current training School "Desserts" features a cheese tray and leaders across the province report that this always makes a hit when they arrange one for their local classes and that more and more people are trying new varieties. One woman writes that since the cheese tray was introduced in their community the cheese counter is one of the most popular places in the chain store. Have you tried the six varieties
