in response to resolutions our Institute sent to them last year."

Creemore held an afternoon party for the great grandmothers of their town.

Duntroon owns and maintains a local park. At the request of the Public Health Nurse this Institute provided eye glasses for a local boy.

Pine Tree reports: "There is a story hour every other week for the children of the community and books are loaned to them with the Institute as sponsor. The Institute supervises a swimming pool one day a week through July and August."

Cornwall Centre writes: "We asked the township council to put a new heating system in the township hall and they did. Also the Cornwall council installed 'direction signs' at our request."

Ingleside, Stormont, met with the Director of Provincial Library Services to learn how the Institute could help with the town's proposed centennial library building.

Savard: "We have discussed the need for action regarding dental care which is much needed in this community. We are looking into the matter of fluoridation . . . We have agreed to cooperate with the local branch of the Canadian Legion in providing a safe bathing place for the community. The Institute provided cod liver oil for the school children of the area."

Sunday Creek in Temiskaming has many projects for the social life of the community — community dances, a Hallowe'en party for children, sleigh riding and a casserole supper, and card parties; invited all the women of the community to hear the Home Economist speak on home management.

East Fort William Institute has affiliated with the city's Local Council of Women.

South Gillies: "The hydro situation was discussed at the Municipal League and as the result of a safety meeting a petition was drawn up concerning road conditions. Action was positive. Also as a result of the safety meeting a cycling course was provided for children."

Rummelhardt, "to get the people of the community to know each other," had a crokinole party for both men and women. It was so much enjoyed that they plan to have another next year. They also "obtained a skating rink for the children."

When the chairman of Waterloo County Memorial Library spoke to Bridgeport Institute the Institute pledged \$100 to the library fund. This Institute also gave \$100 to the Recreation authorities to provide a third playground for the summer. To a family who had been burned out they sent a clothes basket full of canned goods. Bloomingdale also reports a donation of \$100 to the county library.

Maple Grove cooperates closely with the Rotarians, catering for their town and country dinner and this year they gave them a donation for their Centre for Crippled Children.

Elora had the distinction of being the first local organization to make a donation to the artificial ice rink. Altogether they have given \$600 to this project which is now completed.

Greenock was instrumental in having a school crossing established at a spot on the highway dangerous for children.

Eramosa reports: "We have held social evenings once a month in a local school Institute members served lunch. These socials made it possible for us to sponsor a child in Korea."

Morriston had a child psychologist queak at an evening meeting and invited the community, men and women.

Pluslinch says: "Our visit to the Ontario Boys' Training School was an inspiration to everyone attending when it was seen what is being done for these boys."

West End: "We certainly are pleased that we accepted the offer of the Ontario Hog Producers to operate a refreshment book to feature bacon burgers at the International Plowing Match. It was a challenging experience and a rewarding financial project. We hope some of our customers were influenced to serve more bacon and thus boost the hog industry."
