To Find the Hunter Hoodless Homestead

WE ARE TOLD that a great many visitors, sometimes busloads from another part of Ontario, travel to Stoney Creek, the birthplace of Women's Institutes, expecting to find the Hunter Hoodless Homestead there.

The accompanying diagram shows the location of "the Homestead," the house where Adelaide Hunter was born in 1858 and where she lived until she married John Hoodless in

1881. The house is only one-half mile from Highway 24, near the village of St. George in Brant county. The nearest cities are Brantford and Galt. Stoney Creek is farther away close to the city of Hamilton.

Popular Crafts

A HOME ECONOMICS BRANCH instructor in Handicrafts reports that Copper Tooling has become so popular with women who have taken courses in this craft, that it may be given a class at a number of fairs this fall.

The instructor adds that in a community where the Women's Institute and the Eastern Star each have rooms in the local hospital, a woman who had learned block printing through a Home Economics service course, made curtains for both of these rooms and decorated them with block printing.

Another observation was that women who came to a course in copper tooling were wearing gloves they had made in a glove making class; and one woman had made several pairs of gloves for Christmas gifts.
