The only person to hold the rank of Commandeur, outside the Province of Quebec, Mr. Biggs won the award for his outstanding dedication to the science of agriculture, the marketing of farm products, and his tireless efforts and interest in fostering cooperation between the provinces of Ontario and Quebec. Bothwell's Corner says: "The Institutes of our District, Grey North, have taken on canteen service at the Mental Hospital each Tuesday all year. Our branch served through January. Our members sent baking twice a week for a month to a family while the mother and a daughter were both in hospital.

Kohler reports: "This is the second year we have entertained retarded children. It was a Valentine Party. The young adults from the Workshop for the Retarded were included."

Campbellville Institute was responsible for having the village trustees have fire extinguishers serviced and adding fire-fighting equipment; also brought to the county officers' attention the danger at the village's main intersection. This Institute placed life-saving equipment for swimmers at the village pond.

As a centennial project **Dublin** is furnishing a single bedroom in the new extension to Halton Manor.

Melrose donated funds to provide transportation and other expenses so that sixty local children could have swimming instruction at Belleville. The Institute started this project a few years ago and it has been expanding ever since. Next year it will be taken over by the Township Recreation Committee. Tyendinaga East, Plainfield, Wellman's also report supporting these swimming classes. Queensboro reports providing a swimming pool for children.

Paredash says: "We have the nucleus of a good library and it is enjoyed by both members and the community."

With the help of the Cemetery Board, Molesworth planted twenty maple trees in the cemetery.

At Moncrief, when the school was closed the community bought it to have for a hall and the Institute is assisting in decorating and furnishing it with kitchen equipment, chairs, window drapes.
