Plans are underway for tours of Niagara Falls, Stoney Creek and the Adelaide Hoodless Homestead, and local committees have been set up and are awaiting further details from

F.W.I.C.

Ontario Welfare Council

The role of the Ontario Welfare Council is to learn through study and research the needs of people and how services to them can be improved. Much of the new legislation stems directly from the Canada Assistance Act which will provide for federal contributions toward improving and extending welfare services. Through Family Benefits Act, all allowances will be based on need. Nursing Homes Act is a bill providing for licensing, regulating and inspecting of all Nursing Homes in the province. The province now pays 80% towards cost of

municipality operating day nurseries through its Day Nurseries Act.

Rural Learning Association

By virtue of her office, Mrs. Small attended the annual meeting of the Rural Learning Association and Mrs. Maurice Irwin was delegated at the spring board meeting.

Rural Learning Association has promoted and encouraged participation in the Farm Leadership Bank of Montreal Scholarship Plan and has also encouraged a number of farm forums to continue as discussion groups with the purpose of developing their own educational program. Rural Learning Association has demonstrated that it can be a tremendous power and keen-edged tool in assisting rural Ontario in shaping its future. At its first an ual meeting it has decided to become an accorporated company, without share capital, eliminate the financial liability of its board directors.
