The Adelaide Hoodless scholarship fund established at the 50th anniversary celebration is an investment fund of the Women's Institutes of Ontario and totals \$51,427.89. From this fund five F.W.I.O. entrance awards to Macdonald Institute were recommended, these going to Miss A. J. Dewar, Providence Bay; Miss S. F. Cargo, Rockwood; Miss J. E. Campbell, Glencoe; Miss A. M. Johnson, Kincardine; Miss A. J. Stalker, Bath.

The scholarship committee recommended that after 1967 six girls receive \$100.00 entrance awards, one from each of four regions and two at large. In 1967 in recognition of the 70th birthday of the Women's Institute and Canada's Centennial, it was recommended that 15 Macdonald Institute entrance awards of \$150.00 be given from this investment fund to include both spring and fall semesters.

From two applications for the Florence P. Eadie Ontario Women's Institute Scholarship award of \$60.00, the application of Miss Janet Whightman, R.R. 2, Case Road, Sault Ste. Marie was accepted.

There were nine applications considered for the Dorothy Futcher Ontario Women's Institute Scholarship award of \$60.00 and Miss Jill Robertson of R.R. 1, Long Sault was chosen.

More and more the members are realizing the value of making known to the public what our organization stands for and what its members are doing to make those objectives a reality. Not only is good use made of all visual and audio media but also through community educational bus trips, exchanges with other societies, use of seals, crests and badges, fair exhibits and personal distribution of Women's Institute information, our efforts to raise the standard of living, educate towards better health and economic conditions both at home and over the seas, are bearing fruit.

Many more children are being sponsored under various plans as well as contributions toward other types of food distribution to the world's hungry. Communities have benefited most through 4-H sponsorship, local scholarships, senior citizens' assistance, community centres, aid to fire victims, handicapped children and the sick and shut-ins.

Centennial projects include more planting of trees, flags and equipment for new municipal offices, historical displays, teas, museums, publishing of poem booklets, making centennial quilts and dressing historical dolls.

Donations to Institute-sponsored projects last year totalled \$27,965.09, the largest contribution of which \$15,356.41 went to F.W.I.O. Sponsor-a-Child Plan.
