Question Box at the Officers' Conference

Question — If a Branch member neglects to pay her dues, whose duty is it to remind the member that the dues aren't paid?

Answer — It is the duty of the secretary-treasurer to remind a member of non-payment of dues. See handbook page 13, Article 6, No. 2.

Question — Should a Branch have a Public Relations Officer?

Answer — Yes — see handbook page 11, Article 12 for duties of the P.R.O. at Branch level.

Question — How should the flag be displayed at Women's Institute meetings?

Rules for displaying the flag, on any occasion, information can be obtained from the following address — The Queen's Printer, Ottawa. The price is 25 cents and a money order should be made out to The Receiver General of Canada.

Question — When should motions regarding money be presented and voted on?

Answer — Motions regarding the disposition of money may be discussed at an executive meeting but must be decided by a motion and a vote of the membership at a regular meeting. See handbook page 14, Articles 4, and 5.

Question — Who is eligible to become a Branch life member?

Answer — See handbook page 11, Article 13. It is emphasized that to be eligible for life membership, a member must have been an active member for twenty-five consecutive years.

Question — If a Branch of the Women's Iestitute owns property and sells it, in what way can the money be used?

Answer — A Branch of a Women's Institute which obtains money by the sale of property owned by the Branch is free to use the money as they see fit, but this matter must be decided by a vote of the membership at a regular meeting. It must be pointed out, though the a Women's Institute is a community organization, non-sectarian and non-partisan. It is aggested that Branches with money available should consider Women's Institute projects as or some project which would benefit the ammunity as a whole.
