North Dufferin District held a Centennial Cup and Saucer Tea, attended by three hundred guests. A candle was lit by a District Director as the story was told of the entry of each province into Confederation. A cup and saucer, with the Centennial symbol in gold, was presented to each guest as a souvenir of the occasion.

Kent Centre Branch—held an old-fashioned "quilting bee" Money raised from the sale of the quilt will be donated to funds for Northwest Territories Women's Institutes for the purchase of craft materials for Indian children.

Fenelon Falls Branch—commissioned a Fenelon Falls artist to paint a picture of the gorge below the falls. The picture was presented to the 1967 town council.
