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The Honourable William A. Stewart, Minister of Agriculture and Food addressed the delegates at the 20th Annual Officers' Conference at the Wednesday evening session.

Mr. Stewart brought greetings from the Ontario Department of Agriculture and Food and from the Honourable John Robarts, Premier of Ontario. He commended the Women's Institutes for their contribution to the development of rural Canada and said that the accomplishments of the organization can in no way be measured. Mr. Stewart made special mention of the work of the Women's Institutes in the interests of young people.

He was most interested and pleased, the minister said, with the work of Women's Institute members in connection with the Ontario Food Council. It was announced by Mr. Stewart that a former F.W.I.O. president, Mrs. L. R. Trivers had been made a full member of the Food Council.

With the discussion group chairmen in charge, the groups met together for a summation of their previous meeting, on Thursday morning. Later, all delegates met in Memerial Hall with Mrs. Small in the chair. Mrs. Malthy led the group in community singing.

A film, "The Way It Is" evoked the question of involvement in community affairs versus home life.

This morning session closed with a parel composed of Mrs. Sherman, Mrs. Trivers, Mrs. Small, Miss McKercher, Mrs. Charlen, Mrs. Armstrong and Mrs. Diamond, deang with questions from the question box.

Mr. Ranjit S. Hall, Regional Liaison (ficer, Citizenship Branch, Department of Se etary of State, addressed the closing session of the 1968 Officers' Conference. His subject as "Human Rights — Hope or Hypocrisy".

Mr. Hall opened his address by saying. A concern for Human Rights in 1948 case sharply into focus after the first world are because of a general revulsion at the atroc of World War II. The United Nations has clared 1968 as International Human Rights Year so that this year may be devoted to a review of progress, a study for future progress, and to bring more attention to the need more concern on the part of citizens and less lators for human rights.

"We live in a global village and must accept the expansion of the notion of equality for all people. Rights and responsibilities are indivible. Human rights are privileges, not restrains.

"Canadians must shake off a certain apaly toward the human rights of fellow Canados who belong to minority groups. We must stoly and try to understand the feelings of some anadians who feel less than human since to y feel denied certain rights. These people may be the poor, the disabled, the elderly, people of other races.

"Canada is a nation of several cultures of has the opportunity to develop a rich cult of its own if all of its citizens can be made of experience a feeling of equality.

"We the people must make the decision if

this rich culture is to develop.

"The Women's Institutes in the communities have special opportunities to study human rights and to see and do something about stances of discrimination."

Mrs. Harry Judge entertained the delegal swith a solo and after courtesies were expressed and closing exercises, Mrs. Small declared the 20th Annual Conference for Officers of the Women's Institutes adjourned.
