## The A.C.W.W. Council Meeting

The A.C.W.W. Council meeting held in London, September 10-12 was a delight to me and a new learning experience. Perhaps the thing that impressed me most was the fine group of young women in and around London representing the constituent societies who regularly attend Council meetings.

During the opening day a farewell was accorded to Mrs. Stella Bell, a former general secretary. Her sincerity was known around the world to be matched only by her fine work. On behalf of A.C.W.W., President Mrs. Aroti Dutt presented Mrs. Bell with a clock and tea service accompanied by a cheque for 935 pounds. Mrs. Bell told of her long association with A.C.W.W. and some of her experiences while in office and ended by saying "There seems to be an appropriate time for all things and the time was right to hand on the baton to someone else." Miss Elizabeth O'Kelly, the new general secretary, was welcomed. Miss O'Kelly brings to her office a wide experience in Community Development work especially in the Cameroons and Sarawak.

Of interest to all was the announcement that #390 Coupon unit XIII has reached completion so far as the original goal is concerned. In fact, further contributions received will meet

the Home Economist's salary for two years and supply essential equipment, leaving sufficient margin of funds to purchase extra equipment. The recommendation accepted at the meeting was that member societies be asked to support the remaining active beneficiary projects listed under #390 unit XIII and/or — donate funds to be administered by A.C.W.W. central office for direct assistance to approved projects of A.C.W.W. societies. Where funds are donated directly to approved projects 10% should be deducted to cover the cost of administration by A.C.W.W.

We were encouraged to subscribe to the Countrywoman magazine and it was interesting to note that South Africa has far more subscriptions than Canada.

A.C.W.W. is preparing a set of slides of the staff at work which will be available through A.C.W.W. officers. One vacancy was to be filled on the General Purpose Committee and the new member will be Mrs. Pam. Pemberton representing the Manitoba Farmers Union.

The first plans relating to the Conference were released. Some of Mrs. Dutt's closing remarks were that the challenge is just as great and there is need for change — one major change in developing countries is a need to bring literacy to mothers. There is still a need to create better understanding, better living, to accelerate knowledge and this can only come with a change in the home through the mothers.
