W.I. Members Train as Firefighters

Visitors are doing double-takes in the Yukon. Yes, those are women manning that fire engine.

Members of Women's Institutes are learning how to operate the fire engines in case of emergency and are taking follow-up institutions on basic first aid.

The reason — a great number of the men work outside their communities.

The training is part of a "safety in and out of the home" project by the Institutes. emphasis is placed on fire prevention and women have held discussions with their chiefs on prevention and hazards.
