Elk Lake

On February 5, 1913, J. L. Englehart, chairman of the T. and N.O. Railway was presented with a key of native silver welcoming him to Elk Lake in the District of Temiskaming. The key was eighteen inches long, contained fifty two ounces of silver taken from the Beaver Auxiliary Mine, and beautifully designed; the head of the key being surmounted by a wreath of map'e leaves and a beaver.

The occasion for the presentation was the arrival of the first passenger train at Elk Lake. Other railway officials had accompanied Mr. Engelhart and when the visitors left the key went with them. Years later the key was discovered in Petrolia, Ontario.

It happened that a woman who had formerly been a teacher in Elk Lake had become a nurse in training at the hospital, the former home of Mr. Engelhart, at Petrolia, Ontario. While doing a bit of dusting the nurse discovered a long wooden box tucked away under a cabinet. In the box was the silver key from Elk Lake. The finder wrote to Mrs. Mollinson, a member of the Elk Lake Branch of the Women's Institute and the Branch immediately took steps to get it back to Elk Lake. It is now in the Recording Office of that town.
