ESSAY COMPETITION SUBJECT

MY COUNTRYSIDE, TODAY AND TOMORROW

Rules and Conditions

- A 1. Date and number of entries. Societies are asked to hold a preliminary competition. The two winning entries should be submitted for the international competition.
 - 2. Copyright. The writer of the essays and their Societies must understand that the copyright of the essays submitted belongs to ACWW and that none of these essays may be made public in any form (or language) before the international awards are announced and, thereafter, the ACWW prize-winning essays may not be published without permission of ACWW.
 - 3. Translation. Although Constituent Societies may run their competitions in the official language of their organization, the entries submitted for the international competition should be translated into English before being sent to ACWW, to ensure a satisfactory standard of translation.

- B 1. Essays should be submitted with full name and addresses of the writers, and the name of the ACWW Member Society.
 - 2. Competitors are advised to keep a copy of their work, but every care will be taken with the manuscripts received.
 - 3. Entries must not exceed 1,500 words.
 - 4. Entries may be written in ink or typed but **please** use one side of the pages only. If possible, please send 3 copies are each entry.
- C 1. Announcement of Results. The results of the Essay Competition will be nounced before the ACWW Triennel Conference, August 1971.
 - 2. Judges. An international panel of judwill be appointed whose decision will final.
 - 3. Prizes

First Prize: £10. Second Prize: Third Prize: £4.

HANDWORK COMPETITION

A place-mat, for table or tray, size not not than 18 inches by 12 inches, using any to rique and any material.

Class 1. Plain needlework and/or emb dery.

Class 2. Craft work including the use of natural materials.

Class 3. Lace-making, tatting, crochet or knitting.

Rules and conditions

- 1. Date and Number of Entries. Societies asked to hold a preliminary competing.

 Three entries for each Class may be substituted for the international competition.
- Insurance for entries to the international competition is the responsibility of the cocieties submitting the entries from the me they leave their point of origin until rey return.

If it is decided that the prize-winning intries will be displayed at the Triennial Conference in Norway, any additional Assurance coverage necessary will be the reconsibility of ACWW.
