From an address presented by Miss Helen McKercher, Director of the Home Economics Branch of the Ontario Department of Agriculture and Food.

The opening words used by Miss McKercher in her address to the delegates at the Girls' Conference were:

"Today we hear a lot about investments, investments for what . . . along with investments, the word 'management' is always creeping up — management of your time, your money, your education, your leisure — management may be said to be planned activity directed toward accomplishing desired ends — so management is basically decision making.
