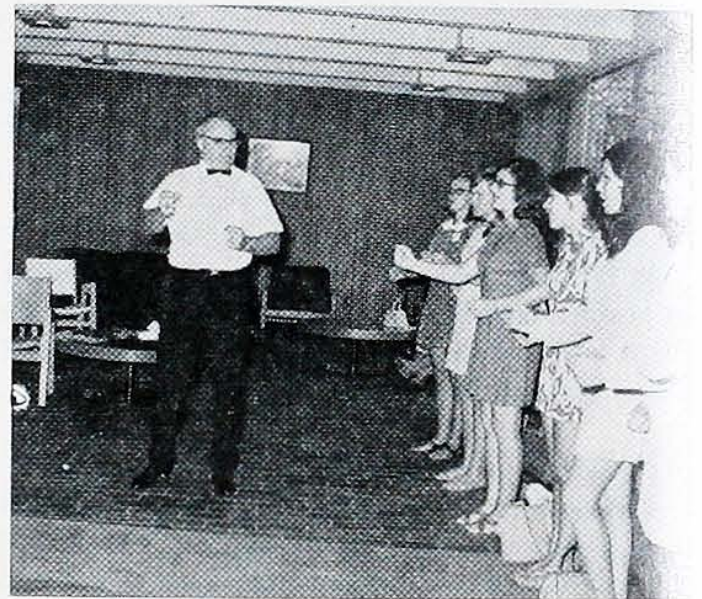
### The World You Make For Yourself
