Bethany — Members of the branch were told that the primary concern of the Children's Aid Society is children under six years of age. The speaker, a C.A.S. worker also said that understanding children and young people and helping to solve their problems is community work at its best.

Clearview — Women's Institute members and others attending a branch meeting heard a speaker define education as the cultivation of the ability to think and learn.

Pakenham — A talk on "Bird Migration" which dealt with the routes by which birds travel from North to South and the hazards with which they contend on their journeys created much interest at a branch meeting.

Shedden — "The school of today" was the subject of a talk given at a Women's Institute meeting by a primary consultant for a County School Board. The speaker said that modern educators think of the whole child, socially, emotionally and intellectually.

Athlone — The local high school teacher addressed a meeting using the theme, "The values of education as related to today's needs."

Eramosa — "The role played by audio visual techniques in the classroom," was the subject of a talk and discussions at a branch meeting.
