Instruction in leathercraft was given to those interested in crafts by Miss Eleanor Flint and Mrs. Layne Paton, specialists with the Home Economics Branch. Girls interested in Effective Speaking were given training by Mrs. L. M. Forsyth, B.A., of the Behavioural Sciences Department, Centralia College of Agriculture Technology. Music instruction was under the direction of Mr. Nicholas Kaethler of the University of Guelph.
