Shedden — A librarian in charge of a Resource Centre at a Central Elementary School was the guest speaker at a meeting. How use of the Resource Centre fits into the teaching system of the school was explained.

Apsley — Roll Call — "Something I have learned from a new Canadian."

Bay of Quinte — A speaker at a Branch meeting spoke on "The Great Depression of 1929." In concluding, she said, "A nation is merely the sum of its people.
