RENFREW WOMEN'S INSTITUTES

Women's Institute Branches in Renfrew County provided ingenious publicity for their organization and A.C.W.W. by promoting a contest for a display with the theme, "The Associated Country Women of the World." There were thirteen contestants.

White Lake Branch was the first prize winner with the all 'round theme depicting the growth of the Women's Institutes from the founding at Stoney Creek in 1897 through the years to affiliation in A.C.W.W. Highlighting the display was a sturdy Canadian tree bearing 68 golden maple leaves with a name of one of the 68 affiliated societies on each.

Burnstown's effort was a striking portrayal of the North West Territories showing a winter and summer scene with a central map marking the points where Women's Institute groups had been organized.

Combermere's India placed third, Lockwinnock's Spain was fourth, and Rosebank's Denmark was in fifth place. Other exhibits were Glasgow's charming portrait of the British Isles, Stewartville's Sarawak, Goshen's Germany. Special prizes went to branches portraying New Zealand, Holland, Ceylon. Burnstown, Bonnechere Valley and Bromley also received special awards.
