

17. Resolution requesting the Ontario Department of Health and the Ontario Restaurant Association see that the regulations regarding those preparing and serving food be more strictly enforced.

An appreciative reply was received from the Hon. A. B. Lawrence, Minister of Health and Mr. J. Kent Hodgson of the Canadian Restaurant Association. Mr. Hodgson also explained that since all restaurants, motels and hotels do not belong to the Association it could not control them. He suggested that if a facility that does not meet the standards is encountered, inquiries should be made to find out if the eating place is a member of the C.R.A. and if they write to him he will get an explanation.

18. Resolution requesting the Department of Game and Fisheries that there be stricter enforcement of laws on acts of cruelty to wild life and heavy fines be imposed.

A reply from the Hon. Rene Brunelle, Minister of Lands and Forests pointed out that many birds and animals are completely protected by the 1961-62 Game and Fish Act. For example, hawks and owls can be destroyed only if they are actually causing property damage.

Training programs in the form of workshops for trappers in which the most humane devices and techniques are emphasized are conducted by the Ontario Trappers' Association. It was pointed out that animals taken by hunting meet a faster and less painful death than those that die of disease, starvation and accidents. It was also stated that destruction of their habitat is the greatest single factor in reducing wild life today.
