## REPORT OF RESOLUTIONS—1971-1972

Twenty-four sustained resolutions were handled from the 1971 Area Conventions. Many were reworded without changing the intent by the Committee and these changes were recommended to the Provincial Board for consideration at the Semi-Annual Meeting in the Spring of 1972.

Fifteen resolutions were sustained, eight lost and two were identical in thought, so were handled as one.

All resolutions sustained by the Board were sent on to the authorities as directed. From answers received, a short report was sent to the ten Area Resolutions Conveners who submitted resolutions. In turn they were requested to include the information in their Area reports.

All fourteen Conveners received letters and assistance during the year from the Provincial Convenir, as well as the Report of Resolutions and the Outline.

Controlled fireworks and its sale; pedestrian crosswalks; installation of red flashing signals; removal of old cars; extended transportation in and out of local town; house numbering; trash cans obtained for town streets; Council opened garbage site for two months free of charge for disposal of old cars; reflectors placed along a curve on hill; a small park which was in danger because of road widening and preserved.
