## KINGSVILLE BRANCH SPONSORS A BABY SITTING SAFETY COURSE

As a project, for the past four years Kingsville Women's Institute Branch has sponsored a four session Baby Sitting Course for young people of their community. Features of the course were—

A speaker from the Fire Department who discussed the proper way to light a match, what to do if caught in a house which is on fire, how to prevent fires.

A mother explained what she expects of the person she hires to baby sit.

An Ontario Provincial Policeman who explained the way to get in touch with the police, if the baby sitter receives obscene telephone calls, is afraid of a prowler, a prowler breaks in, their employer comes home intoxicated etc.

A member of the St. John's Ambulance taught artificial respiration, how to stop a nose bleed, how to treat a burn, how to stop the itching from an insect bite etc.

A registered nurse demonstrated how to change a diaper, test a bottle, burping etc.

The fourth session was examination time. Those successful were given a wallet size certificate. Refreshments were served after the exam.

The Public Relations Officer for the Kingsville branch reported that these courses were most successful and much appreciated by the community.
