Miss Mary Jane Waldie — a former 4-H Club member from Oxford County, explained the work of a dental hygienist. There is a large demand for girls with this training Miss Waldie said and graduates, although always under the supervision of a dentist, have some independence in handling their own patients. A two year course at a Dental College is required after Grade 13 in High School.

Miss Lori Jocius — a graduate of the Child Studies course at the College of Family and Consumer Studies at Guelph University, now teaches early childhood education at Mohawk College in Hamilton. She cited, a love and understanding of young children as a qualification for a career in this field, as well as patience, humour, and a creative imagination.

Miss Calla Janes — a Customer Executive Program Instructor with I.B.M. Canada Ltd. Miss Janes said that basic qualifications for her career were patience, a logical ability to think out solutions to problems, the ability to improvise, take responsibility, to meet and listen to the problems of people. In her work, Miss Janes said that she meets many intelligent highly trained people and she had to be trained to deal with them. Women are not discriminated against in her field, but they have to accept responsibilities as a man would.

Dr. Sharon Kopenak — a veterinarian. This speaker said that any person entering this profession must have a high academic standing when leaving High School and be prepared for five years professional training. A love of animals and a capacity for

hard work are requisites for people who expect to succeed in the profession.

Dr. Chapman said, "My dictionary defines horizons among other things; as "the limit of ones' mental outlook and interests." Margaret Widdemar must have had this in mind when she wrote about a high school graduation.
