

Canada has always had a relatively open policy on immigration. In fact, there are few Canadians whose ancestors were not immigrants. Few other countries have such an open immigration policy and word is getting around over the world that Canada is a pretty good place to live. This has become a matter of some concern to the Government and the Green Paper on Immigration was prepared. The purpose of this paper is to stimulate discussion to provide the basis for a new immigration policy. A pamphlet entitled "Highlights of the Green Paper on Immigration" has been prepared and is available from the Department of Manpower and Immigration, free. Would a speaker on this issue be available in your community? It is an important one and it will be several years before immigration policy will again be reviewed.

You all know that the Olympics will be held in Montreal in 1976 but how many of you know that Habitat: The United Nations Conference on Human Settlements will be held in Vancouver in the first half of June 1976. This conference is concerned with the seemingly unsolvable problems of community and urban development, such as growing pollution and persistent inadequacy of housing in urban centres — especially in developing countries. 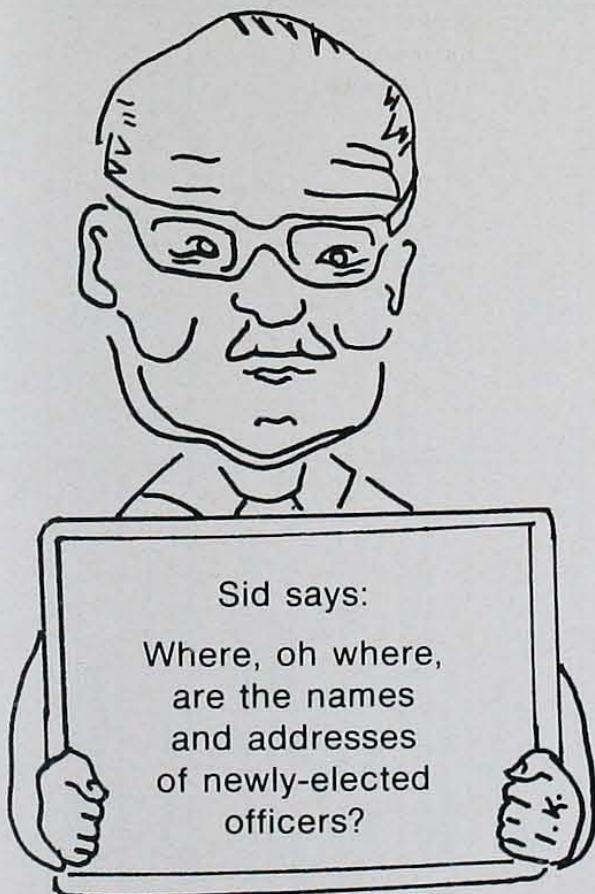
