ENTHUSIASM — it changes a dead-pan salesperson into a producer — a pessimist to an optimist — a

loafer to a go-getter.

ENTHUSIASM — if we have it, we should thank God for it. If we don't have it, then we should get down on

our knees and pray for it."

We belong to what could be one of the most powerful organizations in the world. Let's get enthusiastic about it and take the time to work for the achievement of its aims and objectives and help to shape the destinies of future generations of world citizens.
