We've all seen the small rectangle that is the symbol of the Canadian Grocery Product Code, its vertical lines of different widths and a 10 digit identification number will record the product, brand size, and even further information a supermarket might wish to tabu-

Complete price information will appear on the shelf but not on each individual item. Consumers cannot carry the price of each purchase in their head, for few have such good memories.

There has been a private members' Bill C390, ingroduced by Max Saltsman, MP Waterloo-Cambridge, as an amendment to the Packaging and Labelling Act. The proposal — "No retailer shall sell a product by the Universal Product Code pricing system unless the price also appears on that product in a way that is legble and meaningful to the public."

This member of parliament is working on behalf of the consumer, but the consumer must do something too. The Minister of the Department of Consumer and Corporate Affairs, the Hon. Andre Ouellet stated he would pass legislation to protect the consumer so they know what the price will be before they get to the theckout counter.

But here is the crunch! Mr. Ouellet further stated that unless he receives a good deal more evidence to support the claim that the system is detrimental to the tonsumer" it is doubtless that any action will be taken in that direction."

If you want the price on each item, it's up to you, the consumer, to make your wishes known.
