Although born in the city of Toronto he has strong ties with Agriculture. A graduate from OAC with a B. S.A., P.Ag. degree as a professional agrologist, one of his vital concerns is the preservation of farmland.

Mr. Newman lives with his wife, Margaret, and three children, Cathy, Allan and Carrie at Balsam near Pickering, and still maintains the family farm where he raises Hereford Beef Cattle. His wife is involved with community activities and Cathy is a 4-H'er. As a family they enjoy skiing, snowmobiling and boating, while Mr. Newman is keen on fishing and hunting.

His first introduction to municipal life was his election to the local Council of Pickering, Deputy Reeve and then Reeve. Later he entered the Ontario political scene and was first elected to the legislature in 1967 representing Ontario South riding. Because of electoral boundary changes it now is known as Durham North.

Since becoming MPP he served on a number of parliamentary committees including the Estimates Committee, Natural and Physical Resources Committee and the Select Committee on Hydro. The next step was that of parliamentary assistant to the Minister of Transportation and Communications.

He served as Minister of the Environment from February, 1974 until his appointment in October, 1975

as Minister of Agriculture and Food.

As a member of Cowal WI Grace has served in almost all capacities and in Elgin West District has been Secretary Treasurer for six years and now is Second Vice President. Another community interest is Associate Director on Wallacetown Fair Board.

The family manage holidays in a camper and have travelled to both the east and west coasts as well as up to Alaska.
