Mr. Robt. Eaton MPP, Parliamentary Assistance to the Hon. Wm. Newman, brought greetings to the delegates at the Officers' Conference on behalf of the Minster and from O.M.A.F.

He spoke to the delegates on the changing role of the farmer. Mr. Eaton continued to point out that improved technology, farming practices along with the application of common sense, has helped increase farm productivity. Food prices are very much in the public mind and he was concerned that sometimes the public react as if nothing else had gone up, taking things out of context.

Wise land use is constantly an issue, assurance was given that there still is plenty of farm land available. If there is a need for it, it will be farmed if the price is right.

Five percent of the population is really involved with farming, 40% are involved in Agribusiness, 100% depend on farming to eat.
