tequest CBC to eliminate the foul language so that liseners may enjoy the often fine content of the proramme.

Patricia Hull, PRO from CBC Head Office states: We've read the resolution with interest and very such regret that the members of your group have een disturbed by what they consider to be foul lanuage on CBC. Language, however, can be a very difcult problem to resolve since we don't feel that we hould necessarily censor the way in which some cople choose to express themselves or writers choose have their characters speak. It is not, of course our itention to encourage profanity, but there are some ccasions . . . particularly in documentaries and adult rama—where strong language seems a valid reflecon of character. We try to ensure that language is apropriate to the context in which it is intended. Howver, it is difficult to set precise rules or to avoid fending some listeners occasionally since standards ary so widely among the public."

rohibiting manufacture and importation of aerosol prays.

Hon. Bryce Mackasey says:

"At the present time, the question of the effects of reons on the ozone layer remains highly controversial and hazards of aerosol sprays under normal household use conditions have not been demonstrated. There cems to be little doubt about their dangers, only when deliberately and directly inhaled by teenagers in earch of a "high".

... Subsequently, in a letter from the Aerosol Division, all the points made in our resolution were repudiated and they wished to know on what basis our resolution was drawn up. Request to restore legal drinking age to 21.

Hon. Roy McMurtry is not convinced this is the only solution to teenage problem. He further suggests (1) mandatory identification cards with photo (2) province wide educational classes especially Junior grades (3) stricter control of liquor advertising (4) tougher penalties.

Request the government of Canada to enact legislation to grant an Indian woman the same rights and privileges regarding her husband's estate as that granted to other Canadian women.

The Hon. Judd Buchanan believes the present laws are adequate and provide for Indian women having the right to be administrators or executors of their husband's estates.

If a person passes a school bus while stopped, request government to enact legislation that a school bus driver can take the licence number without identification, leaving the onus on the owner of the vehicle to name the driver.

Hon. James Snow:

The Highway Traffic Act provisions are designed to control operators of motor vehicles and an essential ingredient of such control is the proper identification.

The resolution removing the requirement of actual identification of the offender, if enacted, would reduce the effectiveness of these programmes.

V.D. is on the increase, request, blood tests for a marriage licence requirement.

Hon Frank Miller, Minister of Health:

"As you know, blood tests are of value only in the presumptive diagnosis of syphillis at certain stages of the disease, and there is no effective blood test for gonorrhoea. We will continue to concentrate our efforts and resources on public education, treatment of cases, and contact follow-up of high risk groups."
