Mrs. Maluske congratulated Stoney Creek on behalf of FWIO and spoke to the audience about the 80 years of service given by Stoney Creek to Home and Country. Emphasizing the present is the outgrowth of the past, while the future is the outgrowth of the present. It is important that not only Stoney Creek but all branches assess their present status, and not grow complacent or too content. She posed a question, are we functioning as effectively as in the past? We need "STP"—steps to progress.
