In 1969 Halton District Women's Institutes established an Ethel Chapman scholarship honouring one of Halton's most illustrious women. At the same time, artist Mrs. Norma Langton painted a scenic picture of the old bridge and creek running through the Chapman homestead near the third line and fourth concession in Nassagaweya. This oil painting was given to Miss Chapman as a tangible tribute to an educator who had spent a life-time upgrading standards for women.
