## VILLAGE HEALTH WORKERS PROGRAMME

Dr. Sheila Zurbrigg has completed her work at the Nutrition Rehabilitation Centre, Madurai Project, India for now. She will continue her studies at Berkeley University California in a Master's in Public Health programme.

After a sponsorship of a year jointly by FWIO/ACWW/CIDA, Dr. Zurbrigg was enthusiastic

about the progress of the work.

The Village Health Worker (VHW) Programme was initiated in 1976 in the Thirubuvanam Block as an extension of the demonstration feeding programme being run by the village workers. Six women had been trained in Childhood Nutrition and treatment/prevention of common illnesses which formed the core of a two week training period.

Initial surveys of all children under 5 years have been taken by a supervisory team to obtain baseline date on Nutrition Status, including vitamin A deficiency, as well as a questionnaire regarding Mothers

feeding practices and beliefs.

Enumeration by VHW's of members was conducted of all village households and completed into

permanent village registers.

From the initial surveys the training sessions expanded to compiling family register information initial routine village visits of identification of nutritionally at-risk children and registration of ante-natal women. By October 84% of ante-natal mothers were receiving regular care.

As the programme moved forward training sessions were held for the VHW's to include administration of massive dose of Vitamin A to under fives of the severely Vitamin A deficient villages; teaching routine of Fe/Folic acid distribution to ante-natal and lactating women; also distribution routine for contraceptive pills.

By the end of 1976, one village had temporarily, dropped the plan.

There is a proposal that the Village Health Worker Project will be approved and accepted by the Indian Council of Medical Research. Dr. Zurbrigg says "we have asked for funding for 2½ years beginning immediately. This would provide for expansion of the project to all the 45 major villages in the Block. It involves complete integration with the existing Primary Health Centre and Block Development staff."
