## KENYATTA DAY

Kenyatta Day, October 20th, was an occasion of pomp and splendour celebrated by hundreds of thousands of wanachi (citizens). The conference delegates were issued invitations by the Government of Kenya to attend the Parade at Uhuru Park in Nairobi. Leadthe parade was a march-past by detachments of Kenya armed Forces. Kenya Police Force, Admination Police, the Kenya Prisons Service, the Natonal Youth Service, Nairobi city council and many dilian organizations. Then followed a drive-past of mechanized units from the armed services, National outh Service, Nairobi city council, Fire Brigade and ambulances. There was also a fly past in formation by lines of the Kenya air Force. Then in colourful coscmes came the dancers from the various tribes and connic groups of Kenya. They competed with one anher for the honour of being chosen to dance at the Carden Party at State House in Nairobi later in the ternoon. President Kenyatta's speech was the highht of the Day. He reminded the citizens, "What we hould recall today is not the detail of the struggle for auru (freedom), but the importance of its objectives and the sources of our strength." I felt very honoured adeed to be present both at the Parade and the Garen Party.

## SAVE THE LAND HARAMBEE

The National Council of Women of Kenya is a non-governmental organization with thirty affiliated Women's Organizations including MYW and E.A.W.L. the two hostess societies. It is working closely with the Kenya Government to combat desertification. The women have undertaken a national tree planting programme. Government ministries, school children and many other interested people are becoming involved because all have recognized that Kenya is being threatened by desert-like conditions. These conditions are a result of the misuse of the land by clearing and cutting trees indiscriminately. The end result is erosion of the soil by the wind followed by drought, famine and malnutrition. The N.C.W.K. has resolved to avert desertification by planting trees and building windbreaks in the hopes of ensuring a worthwhile heritage for future generations. Individuals are encouraged to plant a tree in memory of a loved one, or to honour someone, or to mark a special occasion. The site will be known as the Mobil Satellite Green Belt. Mrs. Olive Farquharson participated in the ceremony by planting a tree.
