#### WORLD FOOD DAY

The first World Food Day will be on October 16, 1981, and will become an annual event. FAO (Food and Agriculture Organization) has asked all NGO's (of which ACWW is one) especially those concerned with food and development issues, to participate in national events and involve their members in the Day. Governments have been asked to set up World Food Day Committees, and FAO will be issuing promotional materials. The aim is to create public awareness of the long-term world food problem and so strengthen the resolve to overcome it and end hunger, malnutrition and poverty.

## SAFE DRINKING WATER-GOAL BY 1990.

The United Nations sets a goal of safe drinking water for the world by 1990. Half the world's people—2000 million men, women and children—do not have access a safe and adequate water supply. The United Nations wants to give them all safe water and sanitation by 1990.

To accomplish this goal, the UN has declared the lecade 1981 to 1990 as the "International Drinking Water Supply and Sanitation Decade." To accomplish this task will require an estimated \$140 billion US Jollars.

"That cost is less than one-third of the world's annual arms budget," said Carl Stieren, Executive Secretary of the United Nations Association, Metro Toronto Branch.

"It is far less than what U.S. President Reagan plans spend on arms in 1981."

"And while the USSR spends less in dollar terms on arms, it spent the same percentage of its GNP on arms, as did the U.S. in the 1970's.

For the UN Water Decade to succeed, it needs participation by the people in communities and villages in the Third World as much as the Decade needs money. Local participation and approval of new water systems and sanitation systems—even local design—may be necessary for a system to be kept up and repaired by local labor.

To accomplish the goal of the decade, the UN has set up a steering committee consisting of the UN itself, UNICEF, the UN Development Program, the International Labour Organization, the Food and Agriculture Organization, the World Health Organization and the International Bank for Reconstruction and Development (World Bank).
