We must first be informed and then vocal, — never in the reverse order.

Throughout the conference sing-song breaks were enjoyed and following the banquet the Fun & Frolic items presented by each constituency were an enjoyable highlight. The Conference was expertly organized and efficiently handled, with many opportunities for interaction between women from all of Canada west of the Quebec-Ontario border.
