
Spring Fair for the Community

AYLSWORTH BRANCH PRESERVES HISTORY

AYLSWORTH WI, RAINY RIVER CENTRE DISTRICT were successful in printing their Tweedsmuir History in book form, entitled "Vanishing Homesteads."

The first Curator was Mrs. Milton Fisher. Vanishing Homesteads will preserve the history of Aylsworth Township and its people.

The original step was to search in attics, look through albums and old newspaper clippings, research old maps for authenticity of the community's history over the last 100 years.

Through a great deal of hard work by members and the assistance of a grant, 500 copies of the book were published and have found their way into many homes outside the community, as well as into the libraries in the homes of Aysworth Township.
