she feels this is a good idea and hopes to introduce something during her term of office.

Individually, the Grey South branches are involved in a multitude of projects.

Each year the Ayton Branch canvasses for the Canadian National Institute for the Blind and all branches have supported 4-H homemaking clubs with leaders and with money. There are five agricultural fairs in the district and they are supported by the branches with money and booths. Several branches are helping to raise money for new x-ray equipment at the Hanover Hospital. Grey County is supporting Participation Lodge, a home for the physically handicapped located at Holland Centre, and of course Grey South is involved in that Project. For many years branches in Grey South have sponsored public speaking competitions at schools, by offering prizes and by judging the contests.

Though more often speakers she'd employ.


So what's in store for m'lady tomorrow

This page of the Grey South District Cash Book clearly shows the receipts of the organization in the early part of 1902. Incoming monies totalled \$9 and expenditures for the first year of operation were \$2.15. Secretary-treasurer Mrs. Blasing explained how different those finances were compared to today's. Now the district's budget is well over \$1,000 annually. It is interesting to note the expenses of the group. Money went out to postage, a meeting in Holstein and some printing.
